

Key issues facing Delaware: Divides along race, location and party

Guest Analysis by Dr. Theodore J. Davis, August 1, 2016

About the study

The "Delaware Politics Survey: 2014" was a project of the University of Delaware's Center for Political Communication (CPC). Results are based on telephone interviews with a representative sample of 900 adult Delaware residents. Telephone interviews were conducted via landline (n=450) and cell phone (n=450). The data were collected from September 10-22, 2014. Statistical results are weighted to correct known demographic discrepancies. The margin of sampling error for the complete set of weighted data is ± three percentage points. The author of this topline report was Dr. Theodore J.
